Examples of actual cases, photographs, computer animations and other media help to identify the abuse and the perpetrator. Participants will receive a list of twenty different behaviors that help sort between the potential suspects when more than one adult was present when the injuries occurred. VULNERABLE CHILDREN: Attachment Based Intervention Models

Purpose: To focus on the critical area of research and intervention with vulnerable children and their caretakers. Featuring the work of Mary Dozier with foster and adoptive parents and children. Also presenting Robert Marvin, and colleagues, with the Circle of Security intervention for high risk children and caregivers.

The Institute on Attachment will focus on the critical area of intervention with vulnerable children and their caretakers. Cutting edge research on and empirically based interventions for high-risk children and their caretakers will be presented based on Bowlby's attachment theory and the attachment research methodologies developed by Ainsworth, Sroufe and Main among others.

Mary Dozier presents research from an NIMH funded study of the attachment status of foster children and parents. She uses videotaped illustrations to describe an intervention program she developed to help foster and adoptive parents understand, reinterpret and react more therapeutically to the attachment strategies of their children. Outcomes from this intervention approach will be discussed.

Robert Marvin presents the Circle of Security intervention protocol, a 20-week, group-based parent education and psychotherapy intervention designed to shift patterns of attachment-caregiving interactions in high-risk caregiver-child dyads to a more appropriate developmental pathway. The Circle of Security assessment methodology and the education and treatment protocol will be elaborated using case studies. Attachment outcomes will be discussed. Applications of these interventions strategies and implications for future research will be elaborated by the presenters.

Dr. Patricia A. Judd, Clinical Professor of Psychiatry in the UCSD School of Medicine. She currently directs the UCSD Attachment Institute and UCSD Center for Treatment of Personality and Co-occurring Disorders.

Dr. Mary Dozier, Associate Professor in the Department of Psychology at the University of Delaware. Dr. Dozier received her Ph.D from Duke University in 1983. She directs research on babies and children who have experienced disruptions in care giving. She has published numerous papers on attachment states of mind and psychopathology and on Foster Care and Attachment.

Dr. Robert Marvin, Associate Professor at the University of Virginia Department of Psychiatric Medicine and Director of the University based Child-Parent Attachment Clinic. Dr. Marvin has studied the impact of medical conditions on the social and emotional development of young children and the coping strategies of their families. He has been one of the prime developers of the Circle of Security intervention protocol, an internationally recognized intervention strategy for high risk children and their caretakers. He has conducted numerous trainings and consultations in this area.
